Grading Policy

Our grading policy does not differ from the school grading policy in any way. Our grades in this class are largely based on students' self reflection and assessment, as well as their participation in class. I recognize that not every instrument we play will be every students' favorite, and they may struggle with some of the instruments. I do not grade based on perfection, but rather the ability to demonstrate basic music skills and their effort in class.

Class Structure/Curriculum

Students will explore musical instruments and genres in this class through individual and group performance, and through research of music. Over the course of two nine weeks sections, students will learn the basics of bucket drumming, piano and ukulele. They will also learn basic music literacy skills essential to playing music. For the first nine weeks, we will spend time developing students' abilities to play various instruments. During the second nine weeks, students will form bands in class and choose a song to learn a cover of using the instruments we have learned to play in class. This will culminate in a final performance of those songs at the end of the term. Parents will be welcome to attend this performance, but will have to check in with the office as usual. I will send out dates a few weeks in advance when these performances happen, as they will be during the school day.



2025/26 Syllabus for The Elkhorn Middle School Band

I. Course Description: The middle school band course is designed to further develop students' instrumental skills and knowledge in music theory. Students will engage in various musical experiences, including rehearsals, performances, and music appreciation activities. Through active participation, students will develop their individual musicianship and contribute to the overall success of the band.

II. Course Objectives:

- 1. Improve instrumental skills and technique.
- 2. Develop music-reading and sight-reading abilities.
- 3. Enhance ensemble playing skills and musicianship.
- 4. Foster an appreciation for various styles and genres of music.
- 5. Cultivate discipline, teamwork, and responsibility through regular rehearsals and performances.

III. Class Rules To ensure a productive and respectful learning environment, the following class rules are to be adhered to:

- 1. Be on time and prepared for class.
- 2. Show respect for yourself, others, and all musical equipment.
- 3. Follow all directions given by the conductor.
- 4. Remain attentive and actively participate during rehearsals and class activities.
- 5. Keep your instrument and locker area clean and organized.
- 6. Use appropriate language and behavior in the band room.
- 7. Refrain from eating or drinking in the band room unless otherwise permitted.
- 8. Do not disrupt others' learning process.
- 9. Demonstrate a positive attitude and work hard

IV. Other Considerations:

- 1. Electronic devices in the classroom
 - a. Cell phones or other electronic devices are prohibited in the classroom for any reason. If a cell phone is visible, a principal will be notified.
- 2. Late work and attendance
 - a. If you are absent and anything is passed out, please see the appropriate student aid



- b. All assessments must be completed in a timely manner. Retakes will be assigned on the playing assessment rubric.
- c. If you know you are going to be absent, please take your instrument home, especially if it's a weekend.

3. Emergencies

- a. Follow all emergency classroom procedures as covered in class and directed by the teacher
- V. Reporting: At Elkhorn Middle School, grades may be reflected in two categories: product/summative and product/formative. By policy, Product/Summative grades, which include common assessment, performance assessment (playing tests/concerts), and writing to demonstrate learning, shall constitute 80% of a student's grade. Product/Formative grades, which include learning checks, bell work, quizzes (quick playing assessments), and other work completed at school, shall constitute 20% of a student's grade.

Course Goals

İBienvenidos a la clase de español!

This semester, you are going to learn how to communicate in Spanish about yourself and others! We will also explore the cultures of Spanish-speaking countries and communities.

- 1) Communication: You will develop all modes and skills of language listening, reading, speaking and writing at the specified proficiency level. It's all about communication, not perfection!

 Communication is the main goal of this course!
- 2) Culture: There's a lot going on out there in the world! knowing more about the products, practices and perspectives from different Spanish-speaking cultures will help you to understand and connect with others. also you will make comparisons and reflect on your own culture.
- 3) **Communities:** Spanish is being used all around us. You will make connections to the world, other communities, and our own community!

TÚ PUEDES HACERLO

This class will teach Spanish exactly the same way everyone learned their first language – exposure and immersion. Mrs. Robertson will be speaking in Spanish and exposing you to simple language a majority of the time. Your experience will largely consist of listening and reading in Spanish, which will eventually lead to being able to write and speak short paragraphs by the end of the semester.

Daily Conversations: Challenge yourself to use Spanish as much as possible during class.

In-class Experiences: There will be lots of "trying" in this class, including anything from new foods to new dance moves to conversations with new people.

Projects/Independent Research: Your new knowledge and expertise will be an important part to share with the class.

Performance Assessments: This is where you will show off what you can do in Spanish to Sra. Robertson at the end of each unit. These will usually be reading and writing, although students will sometimes be assessed on their abilities to listen and speak Spanish.



6th grade Units

6th grade lessons come from the Somos curriculum, which focuses on comprehensive input. Each unit will be around 2–3 weeks, varying based on class progress.

Unit 1: Dice – students will learn a children's nursery rhyme in Spanish and use the vocabulary within to create sentences. **Vocab:** Los, el, las, la, dice, dicen, chico, chica.

Unit 2: El encierro de toros - students will learn about El Encierro de San Fermin, a cultural event that takes place in Pamplona, Spain. Vocab: camina, corre, de, enfrente de, personas, toro, entonces

Unit 2.5: La Cumbia – this is a mini-unit to teach students about the Cumbia, a popular style of music in Latin America. Vocab: multicultural, ritmo, indigena, africana, latinoamericana, instrumentos, cultura

Unit 3: Cierra la Puerta – students will begin to use firstperson verbs and all vocabulary from previous units to tell and create their own stories. **Vocab:** Cierra, abre, puerta

Lessons regarding cultural holidays and events will be given as they occur within the calendar year.

7th grade Units

7th grade curriculum is based on the Señor Wooly program, a curriculum that supplements in class lessons with songs. Each lesson will be around 2-3 weeks, varying on class progress. Students do <u>not</u> have to have 6th grade Spanish as a prerequisite.

Students will be given a log-in in class, and will be expected to complete some assignments ("nuggets") on the Señor Wooly platform. They are welcome to work beyond the assignment at home if they want.

Unit 1: ¿Puedo ir al baño? Vocab: Puedo, puede, maestro, baño, ir

Unit 2: Billy la Bufanda **Vocab:** definite articles, fue, restaurante, comer, favorito, casa, botas, bufanda

Unit 3: ¿Cómo estás? Vocab: Cómo estás, fenomenal, triste, felices, estoy bien,

Spanish I Syllabus

Course Description

This is a year-long course designed to introduce students to the Spanish language and the cultures thereof. We will learn useful phrases and basic language mechanics. This class will be taught primarily in Spanish, as immersion is the most effective way to learn a language.

Course Objective

Students will learn basic, useful phrases in the Spanish language. Students will not be fluent by the end of this course; rather, students will have an understanding and an ability to communicate with Spanish speakers. Students will gain a broader perspective of the world through learning about other cultures and the areas where they are located.

Materials Needed:

- 1) 1"-1.5" Binder
- 2) 8 Tab Dividers
- 3) Paper to put in the Binder
- 4) Pencil
- 5) School-issued Chromebook

Classroom Rules and Procedures

- Students will line up outside the classroom and wait on Señora Robertson to welcome them to enter the classroom.
- Enter and exit the classroom in an orderly manner. This means walking, keeping our bodies to ourselves, and using the voice level Señora Robertson tells the class to use:
- If you are late to class, you must sign the tardy sheet. After 3 tardies, it is an office referral.
- Students must check in with the teacher before leaving the room, going anywhere, etc.
- Students may only leave class to go to the restroom or if needed by the office or another teacher--in all of these instances, students must request permission to leave, sign the sign-out sheet, and grab a hall pass.
- Be prepared for class. Always bring your <u>CHARGED</u> Chromebook, a pencil, and your binder. If your Chromebook is dead, you may plug it in to charge it in my room.
- No gum, candy, or food in the classroom unless there is a circumstance calling for it.
- BE KIND TO ONE ANOTHER!

Forget any materials?

• It is **YOUR** responsibility to let me know if you're missing a material. I am not responsible for you not having a pencil, or your binder, or paper. Figure it out! Ask a friend, take advantage of my cart full of materials, something. Don't just sit there and do nothing. (Unless, of course, something crazy or an emergency has happened. Just let me know if that's the case).

Expected Behaviors:

- All students will be respectful of other students and adults. Treat others the way you want to be treated
- All students will listen to someone else when they are speaking. Do not talk while someone else is talking, especially the teacher.
- All students will participate in activities and discussions. I try my hardest to make this a fun class!
- Students will follow all instructions given by Mrs. Robertson the first time. If you need to be redirected, it is certainly expected of you to follow the instructions the second time.

- All work in this classroom matters, even if it isn't classified as an assessment! ALL work completed will work toward student success on the assessments. It is so important to actively participate in a world language classroom.
- If a student is tardy, they may **not** make up any work missed (unless it is an excused tardy with teacher/office note).
- If a student is absent, it is the **student's responsibility** to keep up with any missing work. The student should check Google Classroom or ask a friend for missing assignments.

Re-learning

• If a student earns less than 80% on a summative assessment, there will be a re-learning plan put in place to get that student to proficiency. Once the student re-learns the material, they will have one opportunity to re-take the assessment for a better grade. The re-learning plan will be individualized for the student and the unit, so it may not be the same plan every time. It is the student's responsibility to set up a time with the teacher to complete the relearning plan and re-take the summative assessment.
Students may re-take summative assessments two times. Students may not make up formative assessments.


 This class is 9 weeks of Physical Education and 9 weeks of Health Education.


